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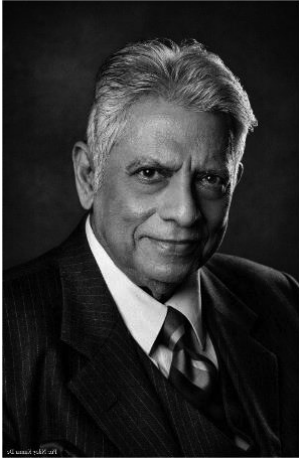
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Foreword

Right from the very moment I came in contact with

Ruhail, I conceived a deep and abiding admiration for his sharp intellect, his exceptional ability to organise events and people from diverse backgrounds (in fact he strung together over 80 young men and women into the Rotaract fold!), his ebullient spirit, his whacky sense of humour, his tireless zest for work, his innate simplicity, his disarming personal charm and his effervescent smile.

Every young law aspirant knows that practicing law is a noble profession. The legendary Indian jurist and judge Venkatarama Krishnaswamy Aiyar, who single-handedly assumed the responsibility of funding Swami Vivekananda's historic trip to Chicago to participate in the World Parliament of Religions in September, 1893, in his classic treatise "Professional Conduct and Advocacy" lauded the legal profession as "the most brilliant and attractive of peaceful professions, with responsibilities both inside and outside it, which no person carrying on any other profession has to shoulder". He further expounded that an "advocate has to deal with the greatest possible variety of human relations and has his mettle constantly tried from every direction. For the same reason, an advocate earns great social distinction, which ought not to be misused at any cost." The avowed purpose of law is to preserve and nurture the moral sanctity that binds the society. Senator Robert F. Kennedy, the effervescent brother of President John F. Kennedy and former United States Attorney General, captured the essence of this sentiment, "Lawyers have their duties as citizens, but they also have special duties as lawyers. Their obligations go far deeper than earning a living...They have a continuing responsibility to uphold the fundamental principles of justice from which the law cannot depart." The Supreme Court of India in a landmark

judgement delivered on 17th January,1995 in the case of Indian Council of Legal Aid and Advice vs. Bar Council of India, enunciated that, "Since the duty of a lawyer is to assist the court in the administration of justice the practise of law has a public utility flavour and, therefore, he must strictly and scrupulously abide by the Code of Conduct befitting the noble profession and must not indulge in any activity which may tend to lower the image of the profession in society."

In 1829, Justice Joseph Story, the titanic American lawyer and jurist, stated, "The law is a jealous mistress, and requires a long and constant courtship. It is not to be won by trifling favours, but by lavish homage." The first five years of the professional career of a lawyer are most critical and invariably determine his success at the Bar. If after his admission to the Bar, the young lawyer squanders his precious time, paying more attention to the varied pleasures of society, the irresistible lure of alcohol, tobacco and drugs and the alluring amusements of the internet and mobile telephony and other modern day distractions, than he does to the study of law and the interests of his clients, he can never hope to be successful at the Bar. John Scott, 1st Earl of Eldon, the erudite English Barrister and Lord Chancellor of Great Britain, once remarked that in order to the erudite English Barrister and Lord Chancellor of Great Britain, once remarked that in order to become a great lawyer, a man must "live like a hermit and work like a horse." This dictum may be too severe for a young lawyer to follow in practice in modern times. But hard work is undoubtedly of paramount importance. Abraham Lincoln, the towering sixteenth President of the United States who is universally hailed as the father of modern democracy, astutely revealed in a

historic reply to a letter he received seeking his advice on the "best mode of obtaining a thorough knowledge of the law" - "The mode is very simple, though laborious, and tedious. It is only to get the books, and read, and study them carefully...Work, work, work, is the main thing." William Wirt, the prodigious American lawyer, writer and statesman said "Take it for granted that there is no excellence without great labour." No mere aspirations for eminence, however ardent, will do the business. Wishing and sighing and imagining and dreaming of greatness will never make you great. If you would get to the mountain's top, on which the temple of fame stands, it will not do to stand still, looking, admiring and wishing you were there. You must gird up your loins, and go to work with all the indomitable energy of Hannibal scaling the Alps. Laborious study and diligent observation of the world are both indispensable to the attainment of eminence." My most illustrious senior and Guru - Asoke Kumar Sen, the undisputed leader of the Indian Bar for over 50 years and the Union Law Minister in the Cabinets of Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, Lal Bahadur Shastri and Rajiv Gandhi (whom I affectionately called "Asoke Mamu"!), was never tired of reminding me on a serious note, "Never tell anyone that you attended the chambers of Asoke Sen...tell everyone you were trained in the stables of Asoke Sen where you were whipped to perfection."

Ruhail's "Black and White Dreams" will undoubtedly prove to be an invaluable aid for aspiring lawyers and law students. I feel confident that they will appreciate the worth and appeal of his book and will adulate the legal profession and conscientiously learn what is expected of them when they ultimately join the legal profession. In conclusion, I am

highly emboldened to advocate to them the timeless message of Abraham Lincoln, "When I have a particular case in hand, I have that motive and feel an interest in the case, feel an interest in ferreting out the questions to the bottom, love to dig up the question by the roots and hold it up and dry it before the fires of the mind."

The Evolution of Law and the Rise of the Indian Legal System

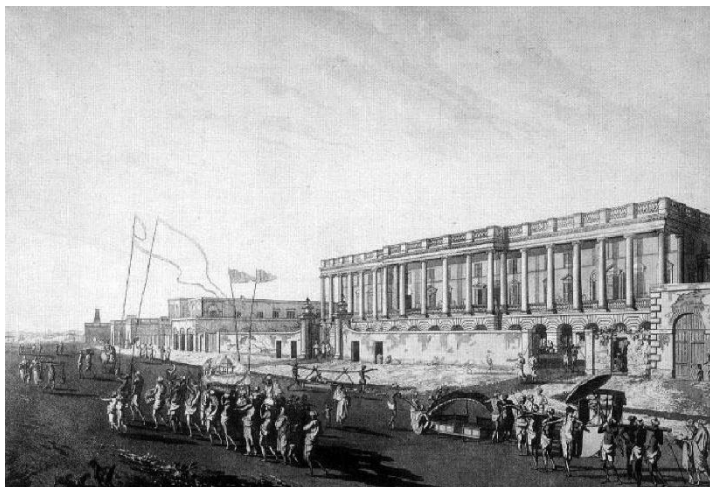
*“Without knowledge of evolution, we see branches;
with it, we see the whole tree.”*

Law evolved as societies moved from kinship-based customs to organised states requiring predictable rules and institutions. The earliest formal legal systems are historically traced to Mesopotamia, where the Babylonian Code of Hammurabi (1754 BC) introduced written laws and graded punishments. Ancient Egypt developed laws rooted in moral order (*Ma'at*), while Ancient Rome gave the world Roman law, systematic, secular, and foundational to modern civil law through the *Twelve Tables* (450 BC) and later Justinian compilations. Ancient Greece contributed ideas of public adjudication and democratic participation in lawmaking.

Evolution of Law in India

India's legal tradition predates most civilizations. Ancient Indian law was guided by *Dharma*, articulated in texts such as the *Manusmriti* and *Arthashastra* and administered through royal and local courts. During the Mauryan Empire (3rd century BC), a structured judicial hierarchy existed from village officials to provincial judges.

A decisive shift occurred under British rule. The East India Company introduced modern courts. The Mayor's Court of Madras (1687) is regarded as India's first formal colonial

court, followed by Mayor's Courts in Bombay and Calcutta in 1726. These courts exercised jurisdiction over the respective Presidency towns and British subjects.

The Supreme Court of Judicature at Fort William (26th March 1774) marked the beginning of superior courts, with Sir Elijah Impey as its first Chief Justice. Early judges and advocates were overwhelmingly British, though Indian *vakils* gradually entered the profession.

High Courts, Profession, and Independence

The High Courts of Calcutta High Court, Bombay High Court, and Madras High Court were established in 1862 with territorial jurisdiction over their Presidencies. Over time, eminent Indian lawyers such as Motilal Nehru and Sir Tej Bahadur Sapru reshaped the Bar, though entry remained British-dominated until the late 19th century.

Independent India crowned this evolution with the Supreme Court on 28th January 1950. Sri Harilal Jekisundas Kania became the first Chief Justice of India, symbolising the transition from colonial justice to a sovereign constitutional order.

Defining Moments in the History of the Indian Judiciary

"Great futures are built on well-understood pasts."

The history of the Indian judiciary is illuminated by moments where law intersected with conscience, courage and national destiny. These episodes reveal how courts and judges, even under colonial rule, occasionally rose above authority to affirm moral justice.

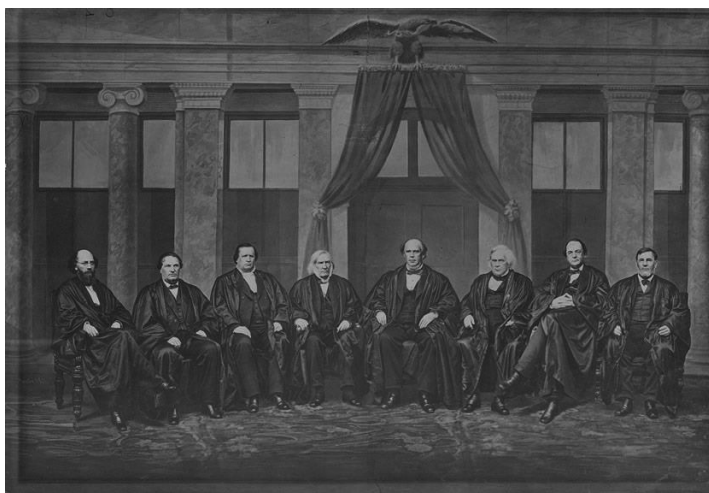
One of the most remembered incidents occurred during the 1922 sedition trial of Mahatma Gandhi at Ahmedabad. Presiding Judge C. N. Broomfield reportedly stood up as Gandhi ji entered the courtroom, an extraordinary gesture of respect from a British judge towards a man being tried by the colonial state. The judge later acknowledged Gandhi ji's moral stature, stating that it was "impossible to ignore the spiritual power of the man before the court." This moment symbolised the quiet recognition of truth even within an imperial legal framework.

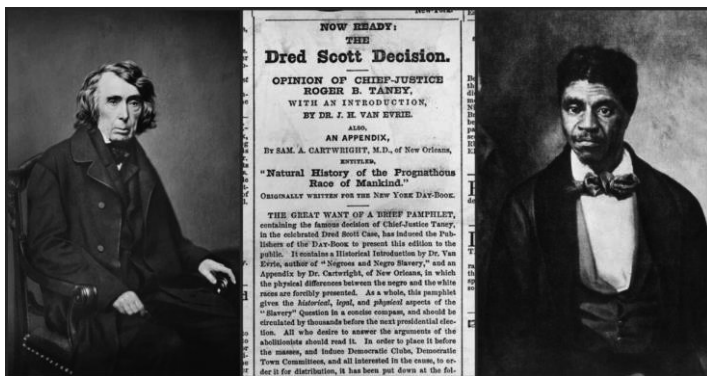
Another deeply poignant episode followed the execution of Bhagat Singh in 1931. Syed Agha Haider, then a judge of the Allahabad High Court, resigned from the bench in protest. His resignation was an act of moral dissent, reflecting the anguish felt by many Indians who believed the trial and execution to be unjust. It was a rare instance of a sitting judge sacrificing his position and privilege in deference to national conscience.

Post-independence, the judiciary continued to shape India's constitutional soul. In the landmark Kesavananda Bharati case, Chief Justice S. M. Sikri led the bench that propounded the Basic Structure Doctrine, ensuring that the Constitution's core values could not be destroyed even by Parliament.

Equally historic was the lone dissent of H. R. Khanna in the ADM Jabalpur case during the Emergency. Justice Khanna upheld the right to life and liberty against the executive's might, at the cost of becoming Chief Justice of India. His dissent later came to be regarded as the judiciary's finest hour. These episodes affirm that the Indian judiciary has not merely interpreted law, but has also defended justice, dignity and freedom often in defiance of power and sometimes at great personal cost.

Numerous fascinating and significant incidents have been recorded in courtrooms and in landmark legal judgments. Every serious law student or young lawyer should study these events, as they not only deepen understanding of the profession but also inspire pride, purpose and lasting motivation to pursue excellence in law.

Judgements That Changed the Course of History

“Landmark decisions turn principles into progress.”

Certain judicial decisions transcend their immediate disputes and reshape societies, nations and even global conscience. These historic judgements define constitutional limits, protect human dignity and reinforce the rule of law against abuse of power. Remembering them is essential because they remind students and practitioners of law that courts are not merely dispute-resolving bodies, but guardians of liberty, justice and moral order. The following ten important judgements stand as some of the enduring milestones in world legal history.

1. **Marbury v. Madison (1803, USA)**

This case established the doctrine of judicial review, empowering courts to strike down laws inconsistent with the Constitution, thereby securing judicial independence.

2. **Brown v. Board of Education (1954, USA)**

By declaring racial segregation in public schools unconstitutional, this judgement dismantled the “separate but equal” doctrine and ignited the civil rights movement.

3. **Dred Scott v. Sandford (1857, USA)**
A deeply controversial decision denying citizenship to African Americans, it exposed moral failure in law and hastened the American Civil War.
4. **Roe v. Wade (1973, USA)**
The court recognised reproductive autonomy as part of personal liberty, shaping decades of debate on privacy and bodily rights.
5. **United States v. Nixon (1974, USA)**
This judgement affirmed that no individual, not even the President, is above the law, reinforcing constitutional accountability.
6. **Gideon v. Wainwright (1963, USA)**
It guaranteed the right to legal representation for indigent accused persons, transforming criminal justice and fair trial standards.
7. **Miranda v. Arizona (1966, USA)**
The ruling mandated informing suspects of their rights, safeguarding individuals against coercive interrogation practices.
8. **The Nuremberg Trials (1945–46, International)**
These trials established individual criminal responsibility for war crimes and crimes against humanity under international law.
9. **Kesavananda Bharati v. State of Kerala (1973, India)**
The court propounded the Basic Structure Doctrine, ensuring that constitutional amendments cannot destroy fundamental democratic principles.

10. Donoghue v. Stevenson (1932, UK)

This case laid the foundation of modern negligence law by introducing the neighbour principle in tort jurisprudence.

Some of these judgements demonstrate how law evolves through courage, conscience and constitutional wisdom, shaping a more just world. Landmark judgments have not only resolved disputes but reshaped societies, strengthened rights and redefined justice across generations. They reflect the courage, vision, and constitutional wisdom of their time. It is not enough to merely know these decisions, we must understand the reasoning and principles behind them, for within some of those pages lie the ideas that continue to guide law, liberty and progress.

For example, courts across jurisdictions have repeatedly taken disciplinary action against lawyers for contemptuous behaviour, misuse of language, or attempts to influence proceedings through improper means. Such cases illustrate that professionalism is inseparable from the administration of justice.

Ethics occupy an even more central position. Legal ethics demand honesty with clients, confidentiality, avoidance of conflicts of interest, and absolute fidelity to the law. Codes of conduct framed by bar councils worldwide, including the Bar Council of India, clearly state that a lawyer must not mislead the court, fabricate evidence, or adopt unfair practices to secure success. Historical examples show that some of the most respected lawyers earned lasting reputations not through aggressive tactics, but through their ethical restraint and principled advocacy. Conversely, lawyers found guilty of bribery, fraud, or criminal offences have faced suspension or permanent cancellation of their licenses, reinforcing the idea that the profession does not tolerate moral compromise.

Discipline is equally non-negotiable. The legal profession operates within a structured framework of accountability. Bar councils and disciplinary committees are empowered to inquire into professional misconduct and impose penalties ranging from reprimand to disbarment. This strict regulatory mechanism exists to protect the sanctity of the profession and the interests of the public. Importantly, becoming a lawyer does not place one above the law; rather, it imposes a higher duty to obey it. Lawyers are expected to

set an example in personal and professional life, demonstrating respect for legal norms both inside and outside the courtroom.

For young lawyers, this reality carries a vital message. Success in law is not measured solely by victories in court or financial gain, but by reputation, credibility and ethical consistency over time. A single act of indiscipline or unethical conduct can undo years of hard-earned trust. On the other hand, lawyers who maintain discipline, fairness, and integrity often enjoy long and respected careers, earning the confidence of judges, clients and peers alike.

Professional etiquette, ethics, and discipline are not optional ideals but foundational obligations of the legal profession. Upholding these values preserves the dignity of the profession, strengthens public faith in the justice system and ensures that the law continues to serve society with fairness and honour.

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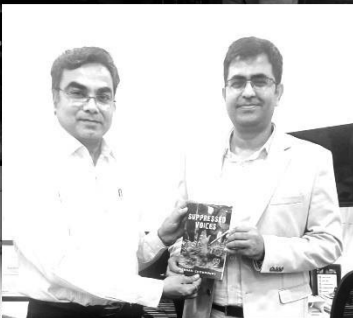
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
